

JERWOOD VISUAL ARTS



A national programme supporting visual arts practice, through which Jerwood Charitable Foundation works with early career artists to commission and present new work. Artist opportunities run throughout the year alongside a programme of related exhibitions. events and commissioned writing taking place online, in London and across the UK

"As we look back in this review of 2015, we do so from half way through an anniversary year which marks 10 years of Jerwood Visual Arts. Since its inception in 2006, we have channelled a total of £4m through the programme, working with more than 1200 visual artists, writers and curators from across the UK and supporting a wealth of research and new commissions for audiences now regularly reaching over 60,000 a year.

Many of the projects we instigate through the programme result in new artwork that is commissioned and exhibited nationally. These exhibitions are, however, often the tip of the iceberg in projects that see us and our project partners work closely with artists in developmental processes as mentors or commissioners for a year or more. Central to the programme is the provision of well-considered budgets for production, an excellent gallery team offering practical and curatorial support and well-resourced press and marketing activity around artists work. We operate with a flexible view as to how artists define their experience and needs; those applying to opportunities self-define what being at a certain stage in their practice may mean. We also pay artists for the work they do with us, whether that is presenting existing work, taking part in a talk or mentoring, or making significant new work. The Paying Artists campaign, of which we are a member, is publishing a fee framework, **Exhibition Payment Guidance for publicly** funded galleries, which we hope will help us to improve our fee structures still further. In 2015 we reduced the entry cost of all of our online-only calls for entries for artists to £10.

As we take stock, it is with the knowledge that artists in the early stages of their practice face increasingly uncertain times. And although our focus here is to look back over the achievements of 2015, we can't end without mentioning the soon-to-be announced Jerwood Artists Bursaries. In celebration of our 10th anniversary we will be making 10 awards of £1000 directly to artists as financial support to enable a variety of self-directed activities that could include mentoring, research, travel, materials, studio support and other needs identified by the successful artists. Keep an eye out for the national call for entries soon."

PROGRAMME

We ran four open calls, seeing 720 proposals for new work from artists as well as receiving and processing over 3,072 physical artworks in the selection process for Jerwood Drawing Prize

> We deliver a number of visual arts awards, commissions and projects through the programme, many in partnership with leading visual arts organisations. In 2015 these included: Film and Video Umbrella and CCA, Glasgow, making two commissions of £20,000 through the Jerwood/FVU Awards; Eastside Projects, Birmingham and g39, Cardiff, supporting the development of two graduate artists over the course of a year through Jerwood Encounters: 3- Phase;

Photoworks, Brighton, in making three awards of £5,000 each through the Jerwood/Photoworks Awards and Bath Spa University, awarding £17,000 of prizes through the Jerwood Drawing Prize, the largest and longest running annual open exhibition for drawing in the UK.

We also made five new commissions of £7,500 each through the biennial initiative Jerwood Makers Open, and supported The Grantchester Pottery to curate an exhibition of 10 artists' work at Jerwood Space. Our Project Space provides exhibition and development opportunities for early career artists within the unique social environment of Café 171, adjacent to the galleries at Jerwood Space, curated by the Jerwood Visual Arts team. The Backdrop Commission, Kyoto 2004, by The Grantchester Pottery remains on display in the courtyard at Jerwood Space and Cosmos by Semiconductor, commisioned through Jerwood Open Forest, is on permanent display in Alice Holt Forest, Surrey.

Jerwood Visual Arts hosts three Writers in Residence each year. The scheme was set up in 2010 and the project provides opportunities to develop art writing on an open platform led and edited by the writers and to offer valuable context and debate by exploring the ideas which arise through the programme.
